Genre reading engages students, teachers

In this age of mobile devices, Snapchat and the sound bite, building solid reading skills can be a challenge for students used to communicating in 140 characters or less.

9th-grade students at Neshaminy High School have been involved in a pilot program to expand the scope of their reading and comprehension by participating in a program from the American Reading Company (ARC) that uses the concept of 'genre theory', which involves reading texts



from such teen-friendly genres as dystopian fiction (think 'Hunger Games') and realistic non-fiction of their own choosing to learn how to respond to literature and respond to literature in writing.

According to Neshaminy School District Supervisor of English Language Arts and Literacy Robert Boffa, this method differs from traditional reading programs by individually meeting students readiness and interest levels. During

the pilot program, which began in the 2014-2015 school year, students were not only reading significantly more than they were before the program was implemented, >> Continued on page 2

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but were also providing more sophisticated responses to their reading while working within the program.

According to ARC, the program works by having each student take on an extended research project, taking a final written product in the selected genre through the entire writing process from note-making to publication. Teachers use a novel or a set of short stories in the selected genre to teach students to read literature and write literary analysis essays. Students research a companion topic to gain the expertise necessary to create their own narratives in the selected genre.

The success of the program led to its expansion to the entire 9th grade during the current school year, and plans to expand to other grades are under way. That success went noticed by representatives from ARC, who asked the District if they would agree to showcase the Neshaminy implementation for other Districts interested in modifying their own reading programs.

On March 1, Neshaminy hosted a Literacy Genre Workshop which was attended by educators from Bucks County and throughout the Philadelphia region. The workshop was held in the Media Center at Neshaminy High School, and featured a seminar presented by internationally-known teacher, author and literacy expert Dr. Jeffrey Wilhelm. His presentation was titled, 'Inquiring Minds Learn to Read and Write.'

Dr. Wilhelm argued that students are more likely to read and respond to texts in school that they are actually interested in. This method aligns well with the Pennsylvania Common Core so it can be easily integrated into the English Language Arts program. Following Dr. Wilhelm's presentation, the educators attending the



workshop spent time observing 9th-grade classes actively engaged with the Genre Reading program both reading and writing. They also learned about the framework used to individually assess these students and tailor the program for their needs.

Several of the participants from other districts are planning to return with more members of their own teaching staff to further observe the Neshaminy implementation of the Genre labs so they can bring this success back to their own classrooms.

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to be even more exciting with an exciting night of hands-on activities & demonstrations with the S.T.E.M. subject teachers in the Neshaminy School District and some outside groups including Bucks County Community College, Mad Science, NASTAR Center, Silver Lake Nature Center and others. CURRICULUM NEWS

Teachers study the brain at the Franklin Institute

During the winter break in February, approximately 120 Neshaminy teachers from all grades embarked on a journey to the Franklin Institute in Center City Philadelphia to view the "Your Brain" exhibit and attend a companion seminar. This professional development session provided our teachers with some insight into



the world of brain science which is advancing rapidly. During this visit, the lead designer of the exhibit, Dr. Jayatri Das, and her staff provided a presentation of how the brain processes images, sounds, and feelings.

After the presentation, teachers experienced the new exhibit that has over 70 interactive activities demonstrating how differently we interpret signals through visual, auditory, and kinesthetic processes. One of the exhibits includes the exploration of a city street filled with illusions that shows how our brain interprets conflicting information. Another uses speech to show how the brain can learn to process distorted audio messages such as the muffled sounds of a speaker on a SEPTA bus. One demonstrates the interaction between body and mind as a visitor touches two protruding thongs with his or her fingers and feels them both but when touched with the palm only feels one.

The purpose of this exhibit is to allow museum visitors to get a glimpse of how the brain works and reacts to stimuli. However, it is made clear that as much as scientists have learned about the brain, we still do not fully understand the full potential of how the brain functions—yet.

5th grade focuses on keyboarding skills

This year, 5th grade students are receiving keyboarding instruction as part of the BCIT 21st Century Technology Tools Course. Currently students are learning touch typing, which is typing without using the sense of sight to find the keys. The middle school BCIT teachers have stated that the students are performing wonderfully. They are very engaged, working hard, and using correct technique while learning the skill of typing.

A touch typist will know their location on the keyboard through muscle memory. The increased speed and accuracy of touch typing and employing this efficient method will help students in their overall academic goals. Such successes include utilizing



the computer as a bridge to the flow of ideas and writing. When students can type as fast as they can think the writing process is enhanced. In addition students will be learning digital literacy and digital citizenship will be introduced to drop and drag programming. All of these mentioned areas will prepare students with the tools to be 21st century learners.

7th grade AE program reaches for the stars

At the beginning of the second semester, under the direction of Kristi Messenlenher, Jen Howie, and Kate Roode, the 7th grade Academic Enrichment program at Maple Point and Poquessing Middle Schools began piloting a Virtual High School (VHS) program titled "Middle School Space Station Academy."

Kristi and Kate serve as the site coordinators for this program and work closely with the VHS teachers by maintaining an open field for communication that includes students' progress each week and any questions or concerns they might have for the AE students participating in the pilot. Because of the number of experiments and amount of supplies that were needed, they took the initiative to find outside resources to support their students' learning goals.

The students participating in this pilot are engaged with handson activities while creating and experimenting with astronauts as they explore the many avenues of space. Students taking this course perform weekly experiments to simulate concepts such as floating in space or observing the gravitational pull on an object.

In the afternoon, my students also decorated place mats by drawing ten specified objects in each of the ten sections of the place mat. When the students finished, they counted by tens to make sure that they had 100 items all together. As a culminating activity, the boys and girls worked with a partner to fill 10 math ten frames with Mini M&Ms. Once the students completed their ten frames and counted by tens to 100, they were able to eat this special snack!"


